Nebraska in First Place at National Horticultural Show at Council Bluffs, lowa.

The fruit judging team sent by the University of Nebraska to the national horticultural congress at Council Bluffs, Ia., last week were awarded first place over the other colleges contesting. The team was composed of O. H. Liebers, J. Kuska, T. W. Moseley, R. Williams, and R. Marshall. Nebraska's score was 390.5 points, Kansas was second with 385.8 points and 23. Ames third with 382.1 points.

The team left Thursday and returned Saturday. The contest was on Friday and consumed the whole day. In the morning the fruit, consisting principally of apples, was judged, and in the afternoon reasons had to be were graded on placings, reasons and identification.
