NORTHWESTERN TO CUT OUT FORMAL PARTIES

PROVISION MADE FOR HOLDING FOUR ASSEMBLIES.

THE FRATS AND BARBS ARE MIXED

All Students of the School Divided into Mixed Sections, Each of Which Gives a Big Party.

The solution of the social problem at Northwestern has been a very live question of late, according to the Northwestern student paper. There has been some sentiment against the present arrangement for formal parties, and it is proposed to abolish the present system and substitute one which is believed to be more conducive to a healthy college spirit. In pursuance of this plan the committee on the social life of students called a meeting, to which every fraternity, sorority and local organization was requested to send a representative. The proposition as determined upon by the committee was considered.

Divide into Sections.

The proposed plan was to divide the fraternities, locals, and sororities by lot into two groups, six of the men's organizations and seven of the women's in each group. The non-fraternity men and non-sorority girls were to be divided between the two groups. Each of these groups was to give an "Assembly," and each undergraduate was to have the privilege of inviting one person to accompany him or her. The assemblies were to take place in the hall of the new gymnasium, the total cost for each participant not to exceed one dollar. The division into groups was not to be permanent, but the places were to be drawn each year.
