**THE TRAINING TABLE.**

The attempt of Iowa and other schools of the Missouri Valley conference to force the abolition of the football training table is childish to say the least. The reason for the action of the Hawkeye representatives in seeking by a flash proposition to get an unfavorable vote on the training table proposition which he knew would be reversed when Kansas was given a chance to speak is not clear.

At the Des Moines meeting only six of the seven conference schools were represented, they being Nebraska, Iowa, Drake, Washington, Ames, and Missouri. The Kansas delegate was delayed by poor train connections and was not present at the opening of the session. With this fact in mind, Iowa's representative forced the training table issue to a vote, with the result that the table was abolished by a vote of 4 to 2, Nebraska and Missouri voting in the negative. This gives the necessary two-thirds majority and legally the table is dead for the time being.

It is a rule of the conference, however, that any member may bring about a reconsideration of any ques-

tion by a protest within sixty days. Kansas will protest the training table action, and at the next consideration the vote will be 4 to 3 against the table, which, however, is not the requisite two-thirds. The present action will thus be reversed.

Knowing thus the certainty of an ultimate re-establishment of the table, the action of Iowa appears pettish. Her attempt to kill the training table merely renews an old bitterness and does good to no one. It is readily seen that Iowa is anxious for the abolition of the table because as a member of the Chicago conference she is not allowed to maintain a table, while other Missouri Valley schools are. This works to her disadvantage, but nevertheless such useless legislation as that at Des Moines is nothing more than foolishness.
