While every engineering graduate cannot hope to become a great engineer, it is reasonably certain that every one may fill a position after graduation, which will yield him a competence and make him a useful and respected citizen.

While, as has been stated, the work of the college is primarily to impart technical knowledge, it should be noted that the preciseness of all work in the applied sciences gives a discipline which is at least as good and valuable as that obtained elsewhere. This fact and the further fact that we live in an industrial age whose every necessity and luxury results directly or indirectly from the work of the engineer, makes the engineering courses of the greatest value to those young men who do not expect to become engineers, but who are seeking an education as a preparation for business and for life.
