W. W. Roper will not coach the Uni-  
 versity of Missouri football team next  
 fall. He has notified W. G. Manly,  
 secretary of the athletic committee,  
 that he has accepted Princeton's offer  
 of \$5,000 to become director of ath-  
 letics and coach there. A search has  
 already been started for another east-  
 ern man to coach the Missouri tigers.  
 Neither will Howard Jones of Yale

**GET COAL; OPEN UNIVERSITY.**  
**Famine Which Closed Iowa State  
 School is at an End.**

Classes at the University of Iowa  
 started Monday morning after an en-  
 forced vacation of a week in addition  
 to the usual Christmas recess. The  
 vacation was made necessary by a  
 lack of coal with which to operate the  
 central heating plant of the univer-  
 sity. When the students returned  
 from the holiday period they found  
 the building cold as the drear outside.  
 No coal was to be had in Iowa City  
 and the vacation resulted.

By strenuous efforts Saturday  
 enough coal was secured from the  
 Rock Island Railroad company to jus-  
 tify the reopening of the plant. Mean-  
 while numbers of students had re-  
 turned to their homes and others  
 were loafing about waiting for the  
 doors to open. Eight hundred tons  
 of coal are now on hand and it is be-  
 lieved no further trouble will result.

Plans have been approved for a  
 main building to be erected at the  
 University of Illinois to be known as  
 the Abraham Lincoln Hall and to cost  
 about \$50,000.

The trustees of Colgate University  
 plan to erect next spring three build-  
 ings—two dormitories and a hall of  
 commons—at a cost of \$150,000.
