**PROM TICKETS ON SALE
TO JUNIOR CLASS ONLY**

GENERAL PUBLIC MUST WAIT
TILL LATER IN WEEK.

INNOVATION INTRODUCED THIS WEEK

Third Year Men to Have First Chance
at Prom Privileges—Committee Reserves the Cab Rights Also.

Junior prom managers are going to introduce an innovation this week in the sale of tickets. Instead of opening up the sale at once to the general university public as has been the custom, Chairman Hathaway will today sell tickets to juniors only. This system will prevail until Thursday, on which day the public will be given a chance.

The prom is to be limited to eighty couples. This is the statement of Mr. Hathaway. "I will give you my word," he said yesterday, "that only eighty paid tickets will be sold. All told there will be only one or two more than ninety-five couples on the floor."

The scheme introduced by the juniors is a new one at Nebraska. It has been tried at other schools, but never before here. The idea at the bottom of the plan is that the dance is primarily a junior class affair. Consequently it is believed that juniors should have the first right to tickets.

Reserve Cabs Too.

The committee plans to go even further than this in its assuring the juniors first privileges. Already most of the party cabs in the city have been reserved for the evening of the prom. The committee has made arrangements to reserve all other party cabs, including those operated by the smaller liveryies. These will be held

for juniors until Thursday. Every ticket sold to a junior will carry with it the privilege of a cab reservation.

The cab scheme grew out of the desire of some students to have the reservation as a part of the ticket privileges. It was proposed that the committee take over all the cabs at a lump sum and then sell them to the ticket purchasers, including the cab price in the cost of the ticket. Instead of doing this, however, the committee will simply see to it that the juniors have the first chance on the cabs.

Juniors Meet Today.

The juniors will meet in the Temple at 11:30 today to hear committee reports and to elect members of the inter-class debating board. At that time the prom committee will further state its plans.

"We are sure of a good attendance," said the chairman yesterday. "We do not need to make money on the prom, however, and we do not intend to. We want a good dance and are not going to crowd it. The limit is meant, and I feel personally responsible for insuring the faithful performance of this promise. The fakes that have been made in the past make students unwilling to believe the sincerity of such statements. But in this case it is sincere, and late purchasers will find out the realness of it to their cost."
