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#### TWO CANDIDATES OUT IN FRESHMEN CLASS

ENGLISH AND COFFEE ANNOUNCE

OTHER CLASS POLITICS ARE NORMAL

With Three Candidates in the Senior Class, One in the Junior Class and Three in the Sophomore Class, Politics Begins to Stir.

The political pot continues to boil. The fact that last week was the time for examinations and the proper time for the consideration of things not political was overlooked. The political situation in the three upper classes of the university has been fully developed for some time, but no action had been taken in the first year class.

With the rush of examination week H. B. English of Lincoln announced that he was a candidate for presidential honors and launched his boom in the freshman class. English is a graduate of the Lincoln high school and distinguished himself during his first semester in the university by his work as alternate on the debating team which met Iowa.

Another Candidate.

Another candidate also showed up during the latter part of examination week in the freshman class. This was H. B. Coffee. Friends of Coffee canvassed the class for supporters, and with their work as a basis he announced that he was a candidate for presidential honors. Coffee is a fraternity man, having pledged Alpha Tau Omega last fall. His opponent, English, is a barb.

With the announcement of these candidates for offices in the freshman class and the candidates for offices in the three other classes the political campaigns of the university are in full blast.

The Candidates.

In the senior class three men have political aspirations. W. A. Jones and Jesse Clark announced that they were candidates for the office of class president shortly after the close of the Christmas vacation. Shortly afterwards J. A. Scotney announced that he was also a candidate for the same office, and a three-cornered fight was started. All three men are prominent in their class and are well known. Jones and Clark are engineers and Scotney is a fourth-year man taking freshman law.

In the junior class the campaign has been very quiet. Only one candidate for presidential honors has appeared in the field and this is E. H. Hahne. No one has as yet appeared to run against him and the field so far appears clear for his election. Rumors have been current for the past few days that one of the popular co-eds of the class was considering the matter of starting a campaign, but so far this report has proved groundless.

In the sophomore class the race is also three-cornered. R. W. Garrett of Madison, R. M. Hawiey of Nebraska City and E. B. Griswold of Lincoln have announced that they are seeking political honors in this class and are desirous of the support of their classmates. Garrett is registered in the arts and science college, while Hawley and Griswold are members of the freshman law class. With these men working in their various classes and the new candidates announced in the freshman class political affairs of all of the classes have crystallized.
