W. A. JONES ELECTED PRESIDENT OF CLASS
VERY QUIET ELECTION COMES TO CLOSE YESTERDAY.
NEARLY WHOLE THE CLASS PRESENT
Nominating Speeches Are Dispensed With—No Majority on First Ballot—Clark Then Dropped Out.
W. A. Jones was elected president of the senior class at a meeting held at 11:30 in Memorial hall. The class meeting brought out nearly the full membership of the class, approximately 185 seniors being present.
The new president is an engineer and a member of Sigma Tau, the honorary engineering fraternity. He is also a member of Delta Upsilon.
Although two candidates, Jesse Clark and J. A. Scotney, were candidates for the position, the campaign had up to within a few days of the election been a very quiet one.
No Speeches.
The meeting was called to order at 11:30 yesterday morning by President Hof Mann. A motion was passed dispensing with nominating speeches. Glen Fordyce then nominated Jesse Clark and was followed by A. O. Perry who nominated W. A. Jones, and J. C. Tucker, who nominated J. A. Scotney.
A motion was then carried which provided that if no one received a majority on the first ballot the candidate receiving the lowest vote should be dropped from the list. On the first ballot Jones received 85 votes, Scotney 59 votes, and Clark 41 votes. On the final ballot Jones received 108 votes and Scotney 70 votes.
