**IGNORANCE THE GREAT EVIL OF EDUCATION**

DEAN FORDYCE ADVISES TEACHERS REGARDING CHILDREN.

**WHEATHERFORD SCORES GRINDS**

The Well-Rounded Man is a Student, an Athlete and a Society Man and Not a Specialist in Any One Phase.

The first of the series of convocations being held primarily for the teachers' college, was held last evening at 5 o'clock in Memorial hall. The speaker was Dean Charles Fordyce. Professor J. L. McBrien presided in the absence of Professor Grumman who is ill. The next convocation will be held Friday evening with Professor Eaves the speaker.

Dean Fordyce's subject was "Some Evils of Education." His address dealt with the duties of the parent and teacher of the child in regard to first knowledge of sex. The speaker said that secrecy in such matters was a great mistake. Information of this kind ought to come to the child truthfully and accurately. An honest effort should be made to make every youth understand such matters. Instruction should begin early in life. Questions are certain to be asked, they should be answered truthfully and tactfully. Unanswered questions are sure to be brooded over and the information will probably be obtained from some improper source.

**Use Science.**

The best way of approaching these matters with the child is through the avenue of sciences, such as biological phenomena. Then when changes begin to come in life, the period of

strong emotions, they will be understood as they are perfectly natural. A large per cent of the crimes committed today are by criminals who are adolescents. Proper instruction should prevent this. The speaker also deplored existing conditions in regard to the present "white slave" traffic and thought it might be partially solved by proper education of the young.

**"Grinds" Not Men.**

At convocation Thursday, Dr. W. D. Weatherford addressed the members of the student body and chose for his subject a problem in which all college men and women are interested in. Dr. Weatherford said in part:

"People of today have three ideals of character. There are many in this world who believe that heredity is the greatest influence in the molding of a man's character. But there have been countless numbers of men who have contributed worthy deeds to this world whose ancestors did not sail on the Mayflower or ride in royal carriages. The grind who is the champion of the text and nothing else has deliberately shunned and shut out from his life so many things which might have developed him socially, morally and intellectually.

"On the other hand we find the athlete who despises the grind. He is the man who sacrifices everything in the interest of athletics. Explicitly, he is not a well-rounded man—he is only physically developed. A third man who comes in for censure. These men have injuriously been led into the belief that the "hop" is the hub around which the university centers. "Thus the well-rounded man is a combination of these three. He is to take a little good from each of them. He is to be an athlete, a student and a society man to a certain extent. These three are easily bound together by a good religious influence."

Statistics have been compiled at the University of Iowa which show the average of undergraduates in that institution to be 23.9 years. The oldest Hawkeye student is 64 and the youngest is 18.
