**PASSION PLAY AS GIVEN IN BAVARIA**

DR. LEES SPOKE OF ITS PRODUCTION AT CHAPEL YESTERDAY.

**IS ILLUSTRATED BY STEREOPTICON**

Told of the Origin of the Production at Ober-Ammergau and the Reason for the Continuance of the Custom.

"Ober-Ammergau is a name which will be upon the lips of every civilized person before the close of the present year; a name which will secure worldwide notoriety and fame; a name which will henceforth decorate the pages of world history." Such was the interesting statement made by Prof. J. T. Lees at convocation this morning.

Prof. Lees was greeted by the largest representation of university stu-

dents that has attended convocation this year, and in a most elegantly worded lecture, entitled "The Ober-Ammergau Passion Play," he told of his personal experiences in Ober-Ammergau and of his contact with a simple people, who, every ten years, stage in their hidden hamlet, that greatest of all dramas, the Passion Play, concluding with the death, resurrection and ascension of Christ. According to a story of almost mythical origin, they do this in keeping with a vow which at some time they made to their God if He would remove from their innocent community the black-hand of the plague.

**Good Acting.**  
After discussing at length the cause of these consecutive performances, Prof. Lees lauded the ability with which these rude people represent the characters in the Passion Play, but he attributed this, not to mere training and rehearsal, but to "a never-cooling passion which this sacred pledge of their forefathers had instilled into their breast."

Professor Lees' speech in part follows: "Located at the head of a valley of the Meise, there is a small, insignificant hamlet. In all, there is a population of about one thousand souls. In the center of the village is a church—the hub, around which are clustered a number of white, stucco-walled houses. From every side of the village, lofty mountains, crowned with snow-capped peaks, tower above the little church and seem to guard the safety of these sequestered folk. This is Ober-Ammergau, a name which will be upon the lips of every person before the close of the present year."

"To any one visiting the place, it would surely suggest anything else than a stage upon which a great drama was to be played, but such is the case. In keeping with the pledge, the making of which brought a reward of infinite value—the extermination of the plague—they will, every ten years, reproduce 'The Passion Play' in Ober-Ammergau.

"The people themselves are blessed with a population far more artistic
