NEW REGULATION GUNS ARE READY FOR USE

TWO HUNDRED NEW RIFLES HAVE
BEEN RECEIVED AT ARMORY.

TARGET PRACTICE TO COMMENCE

Cadets to Be Instructed in Small Arms
Firing Regulations on the Athletic Field as Soon as the Weather Permits.

The new guns have arrived. The "long waited for" rifles for use by the cadet battalion arrived yesterday and they will soon be unpacked and put into use. About two hundred guns of the regular calibre have been received and these are being stored in the university armory.

Along with these guns, which are of the latest pattern, and are similar to those in use in the regular army at present, were received two hundred cartridge belts, with bayonets attached. These belts are similar to the old belts in use by the cadet battalion at present, with one exception. This exception is that the bayonets have a leather sheath, and the old sheaths were made of metal.

DEBATING AND DISHONESTY.

Professor George Lefever of the University of Missouri is purported to have said something about intellectual dishonesty in connection with debating. He says that, while debating one side or the other of a question, the student slowly acquires a state of mind in which he believes that anything, whether right or wrong, can be proven, provided it has eloquence and rhetoric on its side.

It seems that this is only one side of the question at issue. While debating with little reference to which side he may happen to be on, the student of debating acquires one of the necessities in the formation of clear judgment and fairness—he gains the knowledge that there are two sides to nearly every question.

MEN OR WOMEN.

Men attention. A neighboring college has charged the men with being five times as dull intellectually as the women. In support of this they produce examination statistics to show that there were five times as many men who had to hurry back to the farm to help father as there were women who had to go home for similar reasons.

As a mere piece of statistics this is interesting, but that it proves anything regarding the intellectuality of the men or women we are inclined to doubt. In the first place, the men may be as intellectual, but probably do not apply themselves to studying as do the women. This may be due to one of many outside activities in which a man in college is usually interested. He may be interested in athletics, or in debating, or he may be earning the major part of his living while in college. All of these things might reduce his standing, while that of the woman student is not affected by similar activities.

Target Guns Received.

Along with this shipment of the army guns was received a shipment of twenty-five target guns of .22 calibre. These guns will be used by the members of the cadet battalion in target practice. This will be held in a short time—as soon as the weather permits outdoor work.

For better efficiency in the work of this kind the men of the cadet battalion will be compelled to shoot with these rifles the same as they will be on the rifle range at camp in the spring. Targets will be erected on the athletic field and the men of the different companies will shoot at these. The targets will be composed of metal or cement. This fact has not as yet been decided. If they are to be composed of cement they will be placed on the athletic field permanently.

Guns to Be Used Now.

These guns which the military department has received will be put into immediate use. Some of them will be issued to the range detail and the members of his detachment of the cadet battalion will use them in practicing the small arms firing regulations. The rest of them will be sent to the state farm, where they will be used by the cadets.

Not alone in the guns which the military department uses will the improvements be found, but also in the manual of drill are the cadets improving. For the past week the members of the first battalion have been drilled in Butt's Manual. This part of drill is to take the place of the old "setting-up exercises." The manual is composed of a series of movements with the rifle similar to the wand drill used by the members of the classes in the department of physical education. For the past two evenings this part of the drill has been practiced with the cadet band. The various movements of the
