 Wymore between Wymore and Tec-
 cumseh. Dr. Maxey will judge a de-
 bate between Alliance and Sidney at
 Alliance tonight. Professor Caldwell
 was to have gone out, but he was un-

The seven debates to be held last
 night were: Seward-Sidney, at Sew-

 seh, at Wymore; Trenton-McCook, at
 Trenton; Beaver City-Franklin Acad-
 emy, at Beaver City, and tonight All-

ance-Sidney, at Alliance.

The following debates have already
 been held: In the southeastern dis-
 trict Stella and Falls City debated at
 Stella on February 4th. The debate
 was won by Falls City on a unanimous
 decision. The judges were Professors
 B. C. Gregg, House, and Nettleton of
 Peru. The Auburn-Nebraska City de-
 bate was held at Auburn on the same
 day, and was won by Auburn. The
 judges were Professor Anna M. Gosh-
 er and Professor G. C. Hendricks of
 Peru Normal and Professor Edwin A.
 Maxey of the university.

The eastern and east central divi-
 sion held an extra debate on Febru-
 ary 18th at Ashland between Ashland
 and Fremont. It was won by Fremont
 with a unanimous decision. The
 judges were Professor H. W. Caldwell
 and C. E. Persinger of the university
 and Professor E. E. McMillan of the
 Omaha high school.
