SECOND CLASS BERTH ENGAGED FOR UNIVERSITY TRAINER.

GRANTED TWO MONTHS VACATION

University Authorities Give Jack a Vacation of Two Months With Pay—Over \$200 is Subscribed.

Jack Best is to sail early in June. Yesterday arrangements were made for the steamer he was to take and when he was to leave Lincoln.

Jack will leave Lincoln Tuesday, June 14th, with the party conducted by Professor Lees of the Greek department. Although he leaves with this party, Jack will not be a member though of the party. He goes from Lincoln to Montreal and leaves that city on the same steamer as the party of about forty Lincoln people who are to be conducted by Professor Lees.

Vacation With Pay.
Besides having engaged a second class berth for Jack, arrangements were made yesterday to grant Jack a two months' vacation with pay. This will enable him to take the vacation free of expense and at the same time he will be drawing full pay while on the trip to his old home in England.

NEW BOOK IN THE LIBRARY.

Written by Former Student and Professor of Nebraska.
A new book, written by an alumnus of Nebraska, has just been placed in the university library, "The People's Law, or Popular Participation in Law-Making." The author, Charles Sumner Lobingier, has taken four degrees at the University of Nebraska and was, at one time, a professor in the law school. He is at present judge of the court of first instance in the Philippine islands.

Judge Lobingier entered the university in 1884 and received his A. B. degree in 1888. He took his masters degree in 1892, M. L. L. in 1894, and Ph.D. in 1903. A period of only nineteen years was consumed in this work. Much teaching was done on the side. The new book is a large volume. It is dedicated to Professor George Elliott Howard, who was one of Lob-

ingier's early professors. The book contains an introductory chapter written by Dr. Howard. Many cases of law and sources are tabulated in the back of the book. It also contains an excellent bibliography and index. It is intended for use as a text and for reference. The volume is divided into four parts as follows: (1) Genesis of Law, (2) Popular Constitution-making in the United States, (3) Popular Legislation in the United States, and (4) Popular Participation in Law-making Outside of the United States.

3. "Heigh-ho for a Husband." About 1657. mentioned in Much Ado About Nothing, Act II, Scene 1, Act III, Scene 4.
4. "Take, O Take Those Lips Away." John Wilson, 1594. Sung in Measure for Measure, Act IV, Scene 1, under Shakespeare's direction.
5. "When in Disgrace." Sir Arthur McKenzie, Sonnet No. XXIX.
6. "Ave Maria." Verdi, 1813-1901. Sung in Act IV of opera "Othello."
7. Waltz Song, "Song, Jest, Perfume and Dances." By Gounod, 1818-1893. Act II, opera of "Romeo and Juliet."
