AGRICULTURE

The boys in the wood laboratory have made a thermometer back to be used by Professor Emerson in some experimental work.

On account of the inclement weather the freshman baseball team were unable to play the East Lincoln team Wednesday afternoon.

The University Agricultural Club gave a house party at the Phi Delta Theta fraternity house last evening. About thirty couples were present.

Another seed corn tester has been added to the crop laboratory. This makes five in all. The last comes from the George Lee Co. of Omaha and is to be used in an incubator.

The Havelock high school class in agriculture visited the farm campus yesterday afternoon and inspected the work being carried on in the different departments.

Last evening a very exciting game of baseball was played between the freshman and sophomore classes at the farm. The game was called in the thirteenth inning with a tie score.

Prof. F. W. Chase of the farm mechanics department at the farm and Carl Chase, 1910, left yesterday for Falls City to look after the farm drainage experiment being carried on near that city.

Classes in blacksmithing have completed their exercises in wrought-iron and are now taking up steel. Their first exercises will be the tempering of the various articles they make, such as punches, chisels and drills.

The classes in woodwork have nearly completed the model house. When it is finished throughout an opening will be made in the floor of the wood shop large enough to allow the passage of the house outside, where it will be placed beside the model barn.

The University Agricultural Club meets this evening at 8 o'clock in the faculty room at the Temple. Profes-

sor Smith of the animal husbandry department will preside and lead in the discussion. The subject will be, "Animal Nutrition. Every one interested in this subject is cordially invited.

HISTORY A PART OF COLLEGE EDUCATION

MICHIGAN FIRST AMERICAN UNIVERSITY TO TEACH HISTORY.

KNOW PAST TO LIVE IN PRESENT

History Studied Because of Demand for Knowledge of Practical Government.

At five o'clock evocation yesterday Professor Caldwell of the American history department gave a short address on the place of history in the school curriculum. He said that history as a subject in education was a newcomer. In the course of the lecture Professor Caldwell showed the time that history has been studied has been relatively short.

Professor Caldwell said regarding history that Germany in 1830 was beginning to absorb history in its institutions of learning by lectures and but until 1860 was there any apparent development. England, which is one of the foremost at present in teaching of history, was as late as America in adopting the subject as one of worth as a systematic study. Michigan, a western school, was the first to install and teach history in a systematic manner and deserves great credit for the action.

Present Status.
The present status of the subject of history is of interest to every student of that subject. In Harvard there are at present fifty-five courses in history under twelve men, with many assistants. Professor Caldwell said: "If you studied nothing but history for four years you could not complete the Harvard history curriculum." Among the

western colleges Wisconsin takes the lead in the number of courses, and in efficiency of the subject is considered the best school in the United States. Nebraska ranks well with western colleges as to the merits of the history department. We have here at present thirty-six courses in history, and eleven instructors.

Professor Caldwell then gave the reasons for such an alarming growth in the popularity of and the demand for history. The coming in of the teaching of practical government and the training of men for public services necessitates a large field of knowledge of the past and the dependence of the present situations upon those of the past.

The doctrine of evolution also appeals to history and it becomes evident that a man must know the past in order to live in the present.

The qualifications of those who were to teach the subject of history were also emphasized. "One in order to teach history should give years of study and from every point of view should be a specialist," said the professor.

Among the present problems which confront the history teachers of the country today is where to begin in teaching it, and how. It was Professor Caldwell's opinion that the subject should be taught as a science, not exact probably, but the problems should be studied as a system of events. He seemed to agree with the methods used in Nebraska of making a beginning in the mediaeval or ancient period.
