# JOY CLARK MANAGER CHICAGO GLEE CLUB

## THREE OTHER NEBRASKA MEMBERS OF ORGANIZATION.

## THERE ARE THIRTY-SIX MEN IN CLUB

Greatest Basketball Player in the United States Manages Chicago

Organization—Benefit of Local Glee Club.

A large number of university students, especially those from Omaha and vicinity, will be pleased to learn that the Chicago Glee Club, which will appear in the Temple theater tonight, is managed by Joy Clark. Mr. Clark graduated from Omaha high school with the class of 1906 and is one of the greatest athletes ever turned out of a Nebraska high school. On entering Chicago University, Clark immediately became prominent in basketball circles. He made the Chicago varsity, and later was given a place on the All-American basketball team. It is generally conceded by basketball experts that Clark is the greatest college basketball player in the United States.

Besides Joy Clark, there are three other Nebraska men on the Chicago

Students Work Hung—Includes Work in Oil and Water Color.

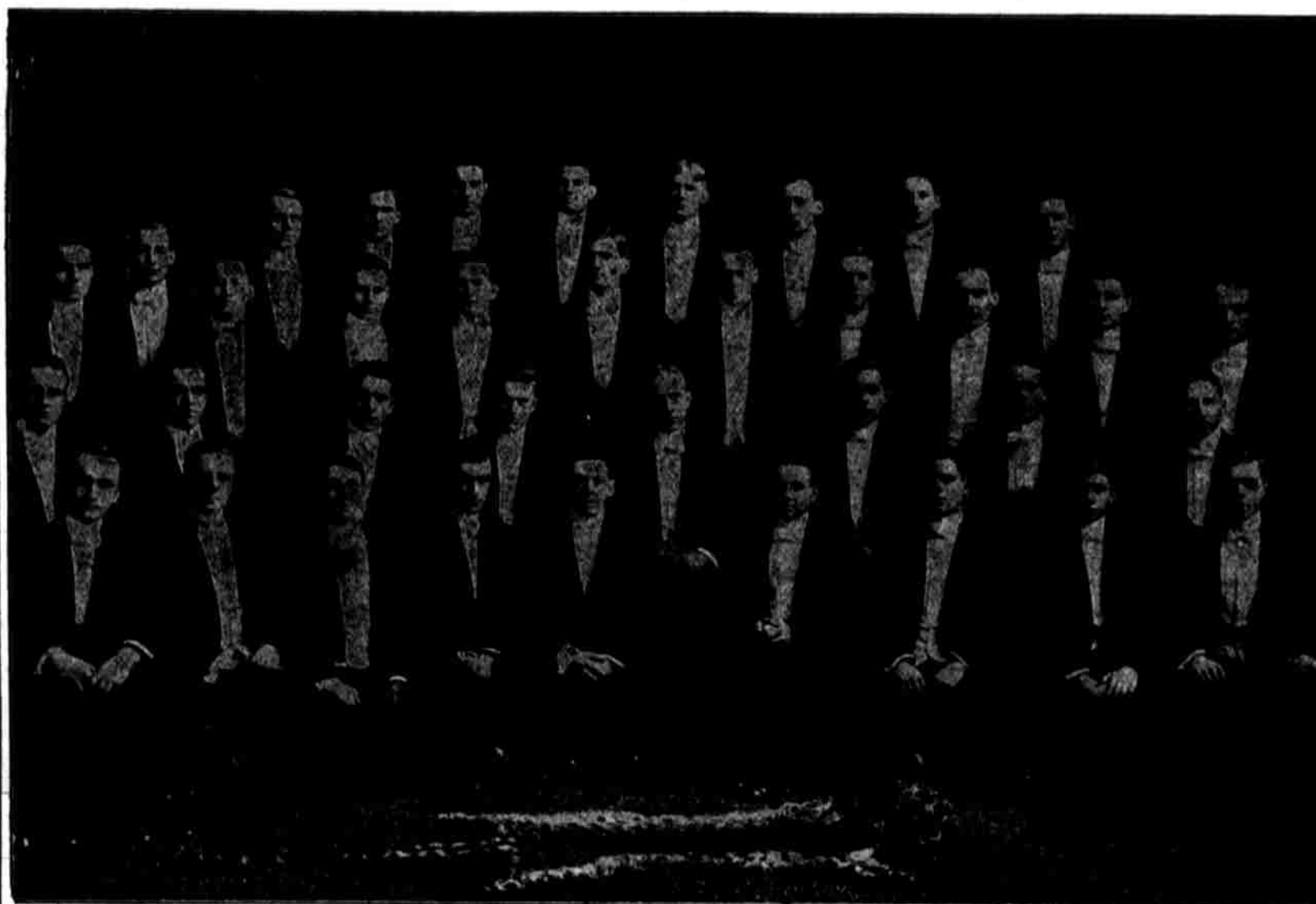
The work of the students of the department of fine arts of the university is being placed on exhibition in the studio on the second floor of Library hall. The work on exhibition includes all of the best work done by the students in all of the classes under Miss Hayden. It includes work from the

## Thirty-six Members.

There are thirty-six men with the Chicago University organization this year, which is probably the largest number carried by any similar organization in America. All of these men are chosen from the three thousand men who attend the University of Chicago by tests of skill and a regular system of try-outs. Consequently each individual must be well qualified for a place in the club before he is allowed to become a member.

The program tonight will consist of both classical and popular music. A large number of the more popular college songs will be sung. One number on the program that should please Nebraska students will be the rendition of the "Cornhusker," with all the various parts.

The offering of courses in both Chinese and Japanese constitutes a recognition by the university of the growing importance of the Orient from the point of view of its commercial and educational relations with the United States. Mr. Yinchang Tsenshan Wang, who offers the courses in Chinese, is a graduate in Chinese literature under the "Imperial Chinese Competitive Examination."
