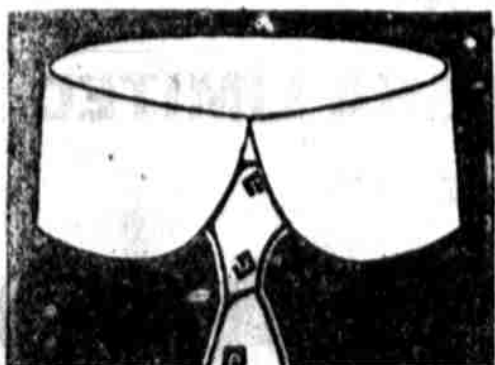

IVY DAY ORATOR TO BE ELECTED TUESDAY

OFFICE TO BE FILLED BY ELECTION FOR FIRST TIME.

WAS APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT

Grew to be Such Important Political Plum That Class Decided to Elect Orator—No Possibilities As Yet.

The senior class will elect the Ivy Day orator Tuesday at 11:30 in Memorial hall. The meeting of the class was announced by President Jones yesterday. Some other business of considerable importance will come up before the class at that time.

The election of the Ivy Day Orator should prove an exciting one, although no activity has as yet developed. The plan of electing the orator is to be tried this year for the first time. In previous years the orator was always appointed and the office has been considered one of the fat political plums at the disposal of the last semester president.

Was Important. The office of Ivy Day orator grew to such importance, however, that when the new constitution was drawn up by the class last year they took the appointing of the orator away from the president and made the office an elective one.

So far no candidates for the place have been discussed. President Jones, when interviewed, stated that in his opinion the matter had been overlooked by the class until the present time. This was partially due, he believed, to the mid-semester examinations followed so closely by the spring recess. Although there is the utmost quietness on the campus at present on the subject of an Ivy Day orator, the matter should be thoroughly stirred up before the close of the week according to prominent members of the class.
