ANTHROPOLOGIST RETURNS.

Compiled Illustrated Book of Japanese Proverbs.

Frederick Starr, associate professor of anthropology at the University of Chicago, who has been conducting anthropological researches in Japan since last September, is expected to return to Chicago in the early part of June. He will offer courses during the summer quarter on "The Pueblos of New Mexico" and "American Prehistoric Architecture," and in the autumn quarter will lecture on the highly interesting results of his Japanese studies. Professor Starr writes that among other things he is engaged on the compilation of a book of Japanese proverbs, which is to be illustrated by Japanese artists.
