Expect to Remain.

"These student-voters expect to remain at the university during such time as their studies demand until the completion of their university courses. Hundreds of said students may not remain at the university during the vacation, but will go wherever they can secure employment, so that they may be in the university next year, and the next, until the university course is completed. All of said students, whether living in Lincoln with their parents, or whether they have come from different parts of the state of Nebraska, or other states, are uncertain and undecided as to their future course or as to their place of residence upon the completion of their work at the university. They do not have any special residence in view during their university career other than Lincoln. All university student-voters are men at least twenty-one years of age-some of them 30, some 40, and a few 50 years of age, especially in the graduate college. They are as a rule without any business relations or connections at any other place than at Lincoln, and many of them will not be engaged in any other business while attending the university. Said students are not under parental control and they regard the seat of the university as their home. None of said students will have, at the time of voting, any intention of removing from Lincoln before the completion of their studies and when they take their summer vacation, they expect to return to the university upon the opening of the term. Not one in a hundred of said students will return to the town from which he came to make it his permanent home upon completing his university course. It is upon these facts that the question of the right of said students to vote at the coming city election must be determined. Paraphrasing the language of the supreme court of Nebraska in the case already cited, there can be no doubt that at least ninety-nine out of every hundred student-voters of the University of Nebraska have lost their residence at the homes of their parents, or at the towns from which they came, and if they have not acquired a residence

in Lincoln they are men without a
