main at the university during such time as their studies demand until the completion of their university
courses. Hundreds of said student courses. Hundreds of said students
may not remain at the universlty may not remain at the university dur
ing the vacation, but will go wher ever they can secure employment next they may be in the university versity course is completed. All or aid students, whether living in Lin coln with their parents, or whether coln with their parents, or whether
they have come from different parts of the state of Nebraska. or other states, are uncertain and undecided
as to their future course or as their place of residence upon the con pletion of their work at the univer
sity. They do not have any epelia residence in view during their univer sity career other than Lincoln. All university student-voters are men at of them 30 , some 40 . and a few 50 years of age,especially in the gradu ate college. They are as a rule with out any business relations or connec
tions at any other place tons at any other place than at Lin
coln, and many of them will coln, and many of them will not be attending the other business while dents are not under parental control and they regard the seat of cone versity as their home. Vone of un students will have, at the time of yot ing, any intention of removing from Lincoln before the completion of thei studies and when they take their sum mer vacation, they expect to return th the university upon the opening of the term. Not one in a hundred of saic students will return to the town fron which he came to make it his perma nent home upon completing his uni versity course. It is upon these fact that the question of the right of sai students to vote at the coming cit election must be determined.
