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CANDIDATES HAVE TO FILE NAMES AT ONCE

ONLY FIVE DAYS REMAIN TO ASPIRANTS FOR OFFICE.

ATHLETIC BOARD ELECTED SOON

Five Student Members Chosen Second Monday in May—Students Must Have Twelve Hours Work to Vote—Faculty Members and Graduates Have Suffrage

Five days is all that remains to candidates for the athletic board to file their names with the secretary of the present board. The election will be held on the second Monday in May, which means that the election will be held in one week and five days. The names of the candidates must be filed by Monday, according to a provision enacted by the board that the names shall be filed one week previous to the day of election.

Little or no excitement has been aroused as yet over the approaching election. Some discussion of probable candidates has been going on about the campus, but few, if any, of the student body realized that the day of election was so near.

Rules of Election.

The rules governing the athletic board election as to candidates, voters, method of polling the votes and other details follow:

"The athletic board of the University of Nebraska shall include five student members who shall serve for one year and are to be elected annually.

"Those eligible to vote at the election of such student members shall be (1) all male students of at least one semester's residence at the university who have made twelve (12) or more hours credit during their last previous semester. (2) All members of the faculty. (3) All male graduates of the university.

"Any student eligible as a voter may become a candidate for election to student membership on the board who files with the secretary of the board at least one week before the day of election a written statement in which he declares his desire to become a candidate, and his intention to remain in school the following year.

"A list of all candidates for student membership shall be published in the Daily Nebraskan each publication day of the week preceding the date of the election.

"This election shall take place on the second Monday of May. The polls shall be located in Grant Memorial Hall, and the hours of voting shall be from 9:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m., and from 1:30 p. m. to 4:30 p. m. The faculty members of the athletic board shall act as judges of the election and there shall be at any time during the hours of voting at least three of the judges present at the polls. At least two of the judges shall remain at the polls and have charge of the ballot boxes during the hour of intermission from 12:30 p. m. to 1:30 p. m. A majority of the judges of the election shall count the ballots.

"The registrar of the university shall provide a list of all students eligible, under the foregoing requirements, to vote at the election. This list shall be kept at the polls and no one who presents himself as a voter shall be given a ballot until his name has been found to be on this eligible list and has been properly recorded by the judges of election.

"Each voter shall vote for not more than five candidates. Ballots shall be

provided on which shall be printed in alphabetical order the names of all the candidates and the instruction at the top, 'Vote for not more than five.' The rules of the Australian ballot shall prevail.

"The five candidates having the highest number of votes shall be elected. The newly elected members of the board shall take office within one week of the date of their election."

The exhibition of baseball which the teams put up was worthy of the Salt Creek Rats or such similar aggregation. Of all the loose playing that was ever made in a ball game that of yesterday was the best exhibition that has been put up on the local diamond for several years. The game was slow in every detail, and a large share of the fault was found on the part of the playing of the visitors. The Cornhuskers come in for a little of the criticism, but the stenographers were up in the air for the most of the contest.

Nine juicy errors were piled up against the boys from Des Moines, and the haughty Mr. Gardner, who tried to play around the initial pillow for the stenographers, made three of them. The work of Southwick, who gathered in the cherries as they came across the platter for the visitors, was of high class order, and he gritted his teeth and stuck the whole slaughter out with a sprained ankle.

Greenslit and Metcalfe the Sluggers.

For the Cornhuskers, Cap Greenslit headed the sluggers' list, although Metcalfe was a close second with two hits which registered him free tickets to the center pillow each time. "Der Captain" was there in the third inning with a triple, which Sleuther duplicated in the fourth. In the fifth round Daisy Cumming, who played tag around third for the Cornhuskers, put the pill over the center doll for a nice gentle little triplet with the bases full. Watters worked the squeeze play to perfection in the third with a man on second and third, and they both scored, and the stenographers were so fussed that they juggled the ball and gave Toughy a place on the first pillow and also donated a nice error to their mistake column.

Frazier Clouts the Pill.

In the last inning, with nary a soul on bases, Frazier, the southpaw who occupied the mound for the Des Moines boys for the last two innings, clouted the ball clear to the fence for a homer, the only hit the visitors got which entitled them to an extra base.

This committee is composed of excellent musicians and a man who is an authority on any literary matter. They have done a great deal of hard work in this contest and their decision will hope that some of our writers or only one which could have been given. The committee has asked that in the future all songs to be submitted to them be sent to the Daily Nebraskan. This is done to have some regular place for contributions to be sent and it will be a place of easy access.

Other Colleges.

The song question just now is bothering other colleges besides Nebraska. Northwestern, Texas and Wisconsin are having contests along the same order as Nebraska's. Northwestern and Texas are offering cash prizes of from \$20 to \$50 for a suitable song. The song writing, however, has to be a work of inspiration and is not something that can be gotten by digging. It is hoped that students and others will immediately send to the Daily Nebraskan any offerings they may have, for the need of the song is great and it would indeed be an honor to be the composer of the university song.
