two years, since the size of the sheet was increased from four to five columns, expenses have been exceeding receipts. Beginning with a surplus of \$650 two years ago, we are now facing a deficit.

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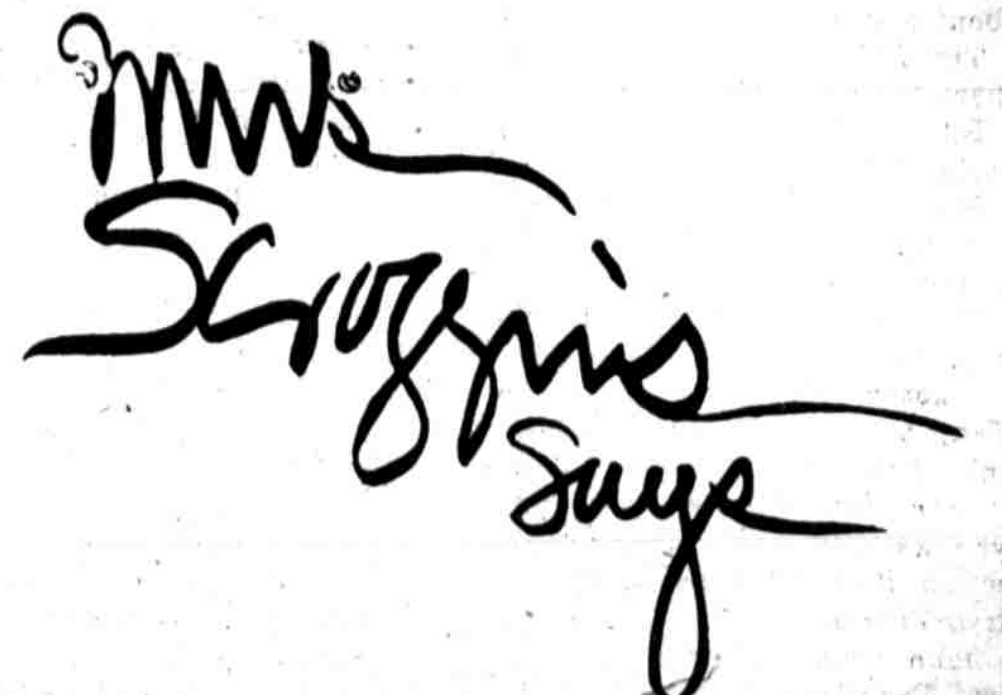
