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**THIRD ANNUAL TENNIS TOURNAMENT WITH KANSAS**

**JAYHAWKERS WILL COME HERE SATURDAY.**

**NEBRASKA WAS HANDICAPPED**

Number of Good Men on Cornhusker Tennis Squad—Expense of Placing courts in Condition to be Raised by Campaign.

While the Cornhusker track team is competing against the Jayhawkers next Saturday at Lawrence, the third annual tennis tournament between the two schools will be played here in Lincoln the same day, and all indications point to the closest and most interesting match ever played in this city. The three new double courts west of the library will be used and promise to be in perfect condition by that time. They will be enclosed by new iron post backstops set in cement. The courts themselves are being thoroughly worked and will be a material factor in fast play.

If it were not from the fact that the Nebraska men have been seriously handicapped all season for courts upon which to practice their chances of winning would be very favorable, as the team will be composed of experienced players who have made records in past play. The Kansas aggregation is also made up of veterans and can be counted on to play high class tennis.

**The Candidates.**

The men who seem to stand the best chance of representing the school next Saturday are Harry Smith, last year's university champion; Guy Seudder, who last year won the title of inter-collegiate champion of the state; Pierce, who has played on a minor college team, and Ralph Weaverling, who was on the team last year. If these men can get into form by next Saturday they can be expected to show some finished tennis to the Jayhawkers.

The expense of rebuilding the courts and placing the backstops in position is considerable and the members of the association are planning a strenuous campaign for disposing of tickets to the tournament; they expect to sell 400 tickets at twenty-five cents apiece, and thus be able to clear up the expense and take care of the cost of entertaining the Kansas team as well. The membership in the association at the present time is twenty-five, and with the increased ground an additional number of new members is desired by the association. The limit, however, will be placed at forty members. Any one desiring to join the association may hand his name to the manager, Guy Seudder, or to any member of the association.
