JUDGE LOBINGER OF PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

SPOKE TO LAW STUDENTS LAST EVENING.

TOOK UP THE LEGAL SYSTEM

Compared Old Spanish System With the Present Government —A Great Opportunity for Young Americans.

Judge Lobinger spoke on the "Legal System of the Philippine Islands" in University Hall 309 last night. A large number of law students were present and were highly pleased with the address.

Judge Lobinger is a Nebraska graduate and was formerly a lecturer in the law school here, his specialty being equity. Later he was one of the Nebraska supreme court commissioners. At the present time he is a judge on the supreme bench of the Philippine Islands, and is considered one of the ablest judges there.

In his address last night, the judge discussed the system of laws in vogue in the Philippines. He compared the old Spanish system with the present combination and told of the great improvement under the present govern-
