the chief feature of the convention will be the unveiling of a beautiful memorial dedicated to Prof. Jeffrey D. Hrbek, the first instructor in Bohemian at the University of Nebraska.

The convention will open at Iowa City, Iowa, where delegates will be royally entertained by members of the Komensky Club at the State University of Iowa. The last two days of the convention will be spent in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in which city, on June 26th, at the Bohemian national cemetery, the unveiling of the monument dedicated to Professor Hrbek will take place. An elaborate program will take place, at which delegates from the various Komensky Clubs from the different universities will be present. Among the speakers who will participate during the ceremony of unveiling the memorial are Rev. Jos. Newton of the Liberal Christian church of Cedar Rapids, Iowa; Prof. J. J. McConnell and Prof. Bohumil Shimek of the State University of Iowa; J. E. Bednar of Lincoln, Neb., in behalf of the United Komensky Clubs.

The entire monument is over fourteen feet in height. On the base of the monument is the name "J. R. Hrbek," and on the tablets on either side appear the following inscriptions:

"Jeffrey D. Hrbek. Born August 21, 1882, Cedar Rapids, Io. First Instructor of the Bohemian Language at University of Nebraska. Died December 4, 1907, at Lincoln, Neb. Erected by his friends under the auspices of the Komensky Clubs."

"Here on the hill is the burial ground.
