feels that it is useless to try to raise the standard of honor among the students; that public opinion cannot be educated, and that all the cheating is done by students who are deliberately dishonest. She thinks that the faculty ought to have a large number of proctors, monitors and spies to watch the students and report them. This, in her opinion, would be no insult to the honest student, whereas the request to sign a pledge saying that he was going to be honest would be an insult.

These views are given here at length in order that the girls may consider them. The movement is not confined to any one organization or set of organizations. It concerns all the women in the school. Let us stand on our own merits during the coming examination, talk our plans over with our parents during the summer, and come back in the fall determined to raise the standard of honor here if it be possible. We can count upon cordial co-operation from the chancellor, the advisor of women, the registrar and faculty. If the plan first stated is best, and only the faculty can help matters, let us hope that they will be brought to a realization of the fact. But if the move must come from the students, then let us all work together.
