### KOMENSKY CLUB MEETS.

Bohemian Students Plan Work for the Coming Year.

Members of the Komensky club and other Bohemian students of the University were entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Herman Friday evening at their home, 1621 M street. The scope and nature of the club were discussed by Prof. Sarka Hrbek. All Bohemian students were urged to become Komensky workers, and it was apparent that those present were heartily in sympathy with the cause.

A large number of new Bohemian students are enrolled in the University this year. Nearly all of them take advantage of the courses offered by the Slavonic department and the majority take an active interest in the Komensky organization.

The Komensky movement was inaugurated by students at this University in 1906. Two years later it became a Federation of Komensky clubs, which at present includes fifteen organizations, representing several states and six universities.

The Federation publishes a monthly magazine, the "Komensky," having a circulation of a thousand copies, which reach young people in all the
