EXPERIENCE OF UNIVERSITY MEN

The Nebraska School of Business, located in the Hall Bros. building, 1519 O street, is organizing special afternoon and evening classes at convenient hours for university students who wish to study either shorthand, typewriting, bookkeeping or penmanship. The evening classes meet three evenings each week—Monday, Wednesday and Friday. University students may arrange for any number of hours per week that they may wish to take, and the rates for tuition will be very reasonable. The instruction is given by teachers of long experience and recognized ability.

Mr. Glenn O. Taylor, B. A., LL. B., speaking from his own experience, says: "I have no hesitation in saying that I believe the freshman in college makes a mistake if he does not avail himself of the opportunity of studying shorthand and typewriting. The student who has a knowledge of shorthand has not only a very rapid means of taking notes from class work to be used

later as references in preparation for reviews and examinations, but also has a knowledge which may be readily turned into money during his spare hours and vacations. Moreover, such student, when his college course is finished, is assured immediate employment in the commercial world."

Mr. Frank Oates, a student of the N. S. B.; who held a position with the B. & M. in this city last year, is now saying his way through Northwestern, at Evanston, with his shorthand and typewriting.

Y. M. C. A. WANTS 1000 MEN

BIG CAMPAIGN FOR LARGE MEMBERSHIP IS LAUNCHED.

TWO DAYS ALLOWED FOR WORK

WILL FORBES HAS CHARGE OF COMMITTEE TO GET MEN.

Record Kept on Clock—Members to Be Tagged—Nebraska to Be First in List.

Last night at a big "feed" in the Temple building the annual membership campaign for new Y. M. C. A. members was inaugurated. This was the initial "opener" in the two days' whirlwind campaign that is to take place today and tomorrow. Mr. Mayne of the city association spoke a few words, as did several others, both of the alumni and student body.

The Goal.
The goal this year is to be 1,000 members, and indications point to a realization of these figures. Between 100 and 150 men under the leadership of Will Forbes are to be actively engaged in attaining this large membership for the college association. Among these are many prominent men, as "Jack" Temple, Ray Rice, Ralph Weaverling, Walter Chauner and Sidney Collins.

Two years ago the Nebraska Y. M. C. A. stood sixth in the list of the colleges and universities of North America. Last year the position had been changed to third place, and this year the hopes are held that Nebraska may lead the list.

The plan of the committee in charge is to interview every man on the campus. This is very likely to be accomplished as all departments in school are represented in the work. On consenting to join a Y. M. C. A. button is given the new member, and he is thus rendered immune from further attacks.

A clock on the Temple building will give up to date accounts of how the campaign is progressing.

More Entertainments.

The Y. M. C. A. has held several entertainments so far this fall, and have several more to follow. R. F. Curtis, chairman of the social committee, is planning some unique stunts. In addition to this an employment bureau is maintained by the association which is of great aid in helping self-sustaining students. The student hand-book is also gotten out and distributed free of charge to every one desiring it.

By its activity the Y. M. C. A. has shown itself worthy the loyal support of every Nebraska man. The membership fee is \$1 for the year. This entitles the member not only to the privileges of the university Y. M. C. A. but also to stop-over advantages in the city associations of the country.
