FIRST BULLETIN OUT.

Scientific Work in Agriculture Developed in Philippines.

Dr. Bessey has received the first bulletin of the college of agriculture of the University of the Philippines. A new era has dawned in the Philippines. Farming has reached the stage in the islands where the organization of a college for the study of scientific agriculture has become expedient. The University of the Philippines was authorized by the United States congress in an act passed June 18, 1908. This enactment authorized the governor-general of the Philippines "to establish in the city of Manila, or at the point he may deem most expedient, a university which shall be known as the 'University of the Philippines,' the same being organized as a corporation
