NEW MAGAZINE RACK.

Valuable Additions to the Botanical Library.

Dr. Walker, who has charge of the botany library, has just announced the installation of a new magazine rack in the department library. This rack is equipped with pigeon holes enough to hold over one hundred current magazines. There are at the present time sixty-one botanical and scientific magazines on file in this case. Most of the publications are issued monthly. The periodicals which are considered of the most importance have been placed in the top pigeon holes, so that they may be easily chosen by the student who is in search of the latest and most reliable references on botanical topics.

BOTANY DEPARTMENT SWAMPED

Students Next Year to Be Advised to Register for Other Courses.

Dr. Bessey announced to his botany classes yesterday that there were at the present time twenty per cent more students in beginning botany than ever before. He said that the enrollment had reached the limit. An increase next year equal to that of this fall would swamp the department entirely. The laboratory limit for any one week is three hundred and eighty-five. A twenty per cent increase next fall would make necessary the enlargement of the present laboratories to a capacity of nearly a dozen new students for each work period. It would also require another assistant for each crowded session.

On the whole, Dr. Bessey advised the students to urge the freshmen next year to take some other course. Something must be done to depopularize the botany course. The great increase in numbers each year is said to be due to the quality of the course provided by Dr. Bessey, who is one of the foremost botanists of the day. The department of botany has steadily grown under his direction.

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STATION A HAS MANY LETTERS

Students Mail is Held Until Address of Consignee is Learned.

Great quantities of mail—letters, papers, post cards, circulars and even valuable packages—are accumulating at Station A, the University post-office. Doubtless a goodly number of students who have been looking for "that letter from home" or "the things I forgot when I left," would be enabled to solve the mystery by applying at the general delivery window at Station A.

The new students, who attend the University for the first time, are not to be located by means of the city or student directories, and therefore the postal authorities have no small job on their hands when they attempt to discover the destination of several hundred letters which are addressed only "Station A."

Students who gave one address when they registered and then moved to the other side of the city on the day following can hardly expect the records in the Registrar's office or the postoffice to be accurate. Such students are required to notify the Registrar and the postoffice authorities at Station A of their change of residence. Lincoln postal authorities have something like six to seven thousand of students to keep track of each school year.
