GETTING READY.

University of Iowa Practicing for Purdue—Alexander Will Play.
Iowa City, Ia.—A heavy scrimmage was the order of the evening Wednesday in the practice of the Hawkeye team in preparation for the game next Saturday with Purdue. In view of the fact that the Indiana team did not have a game last Saturday it is expected that they will be in prime condition for the Saturday contest in Iowa City. Accordingly, Coach Hawley will spare no efforts this week to whip the Iowa team into condition for the contest. The addition of Alexander, the big colored tackle who was not taken to Missouri on account of the color feeling in that school, will again be in the game with Purdue, and in his old position at tackle where he will materially strengthen the Hawkeye line. Weeks, who has been playing at guard and at end, was not on the field last evening, having been called home by the death of his mother. However, he is expected to return the latter part of the week and will probably be in Saturday's game.

CHANGE DEFENSE.

Yost Will Not Continue to Use Captain Benbrook.

Ann Arbor, Mich.—It is more than likely that Michigan will use an entirely different defensive formation from now on. Benbrook's work as defensive quarterback has not been entirely satisfactory at any time, and he has made numerous errors while playing that position. Those who are most familiar with the workings of the team will not be at all surprised if Benbrook returns to his position at left guard on both offense and defense from now on. Who will play loose behind the line when Michigan's opponent's are in possession of the ball is a big question. Several men are available for the place, and it is likely that Edmunds or Conklin will be given an opportunity to show what they can do.

Marquette Wins.

Marquette defeated St. Mary's Wednesday by a score of 15 to 0. The game was featureless.

A replica of the cast of the portal of the great temple of Baal Shamin at Siah, belonging to the collection of casts made by the Princeton Archaeological Expedition to Syria in 1904-05, has just been completed and is now being boxed for shipment to the Kaiser Frederick museum in Berlin. This is a gift of the Princeton scientists to the noted museum.

Michigan's football prospects have received a serious setback as a result of the first serious accident of the season. Harrington was carrying the ball from his position, halfback, and after dashing off right tackle for a substan-

tial gain he was tackled in such a way as to break a small bone in his right leg just above the ankle.

Miss Anderson, who visited the Y. W. C. A. yesterday and delivered several interesting lectures, came directly from the land of the Eskimos. She has been stationed for the past few years on the St. Lawrence islands of the Bering sea, and was in a position to carry on a very extensive investigation of Eskimo manners and customs.

A great deal of interest has been aroused by the girls in an effort to "boom" this class, it being considered one of the best opportunities open to the members of the association to do Bible study work.

Providing the weather is favorable, the Y. W. C. A. picnic breakfast which was slated for Saturday morning will be pulled off according to schedule. Every new member is urged to attend, and old girls may attend on the condition that they "fetch" a new member.

The Navy football squad has returned to Annapolis after a summer cruise in European waters and are in excellent condition as a result of the hard work and healthy conditions. The coaches believe that never before has the season been begun with such favorable prospects.

Preliminary registration figures indicating that the total enrollment for the year at the University of Wisconsin will exceed 5,500 have just been made public. The number enrolled when the computation was made was 3,869. This is an increase of 12 per cent over the same period a year ago.

Minnesota, and Dakota colleges have agreed to allow their ball players to play professional ball during the summer months without losing their athletic standing.

Harvard has begun its 275th year with an enrollment of 5,000 students. Yale is 210 years old and has received gifts amounting to \$2,398,291 during the last year.

The freshman medical class at the University of Iowa numbers only twenty-four students, due to the new requirement of two years collegiate work.
