Dairy Team Wins \$400 Scholarship at Chicago.

The Nebraska dairy team returned Sunday from Chicago where they entered the judging contest at the Chicago colesium.

The team was composed of Otto H. debers, Joseph Kuska and Ivan P McKillips.

Mr. Liebers and Kuska were on the team that took first place over Missouri, Kansas and Iowa last year. Mr. McKillips was second high man on Nebraska's fat stock team, which entered the international contest at Chicago last season.

This year McKillips was winner of the \$400 scholarship, which was offered by the American Jersey Cattle Club to the man making the highest score in that breed. This-scholarship is good in any college or university in the United States.

Last year no schoarships were offered, but three beautiful cups were brought back by the Nebraska team.


