### RALLY IS WELL ATTENDED

STUDENTS TURN OUT AND STIR UP ENTHUSIASM.

"KANSAS CANNOT WIN" THE SLOGAN

STELK WAS CALLED FOR BUT DID NOT SHOW UP.

Eager Urges that Every Student Who Can Scrape Up \$7.50 Buy a Round Trip Ticket.

"Kansas Cannot Win" was the slogan which was born yesterday at the football rally in Memorial hall. The rally was better attended than any this season. The room was crowded. Students to the number of hundreds lined the south wall and stood in the back of the room, and a number of men occupied seats in the windows. Scidom has the old hall been nearer to overflowing.

At the opening of the rally, the team was called to the platform. While the players were getting seated on the platform some students became enthusiastic and managed to call out all sorts of things. Cries of, "Stelk, let's see Stelk," were heard from the south side of the room, but the big sophomore was conspicuously absent. At least he was not ushered to the platform.

Dr. Edwin Maxey spoke on the "History of the Game." Ben Cherrington was also called upon for a few remarks. Captain Jack Temple said that he and the rest of the boys would do their best at Kansas and wanted the support of Nebraska rooters.

The real event of the rally was the short speech by "Dog" Eager, Nebraska's popular athletic manager. Eager explained the arrangements for the special train to Kansas. He urged students who wanted to be loyal to go to Lawrence for the big game. The fare will be only \$7.50. Pullman tourist and regular cars will make up the special train. Cars will have to be ordered from the Union Pacific headquarters at Omaha not later than Thursday night. It is, therefore, important that berths be engaged and tickets purchased at once. The special will leave Friday evening and reach Lawrence before the arrival of the team. It is planned for the excursionists to meet the Cornhuskers and escort them "up town" with real college spirit. "On to Kansas" must be the watchword," is the way Eager put it.
