## AMES STANDS IN THE WAY

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME WILL BE PLAYED HERE SATURDAY.

## PENNANT "DOPED" UP FOR NEBRASKA

CORNHUSKERS ARE CLOSING SEASON WITH A "SPURGE."

Scarlet and Cream Line Is One of the Best Ever Put Out in the Valley.

Nebraska will play Ames for the Missouri Valley championship on Nebraska field Saturday afternoon. Cole thinks his men can win. 'Nuf Sed.

While a number of the Cornhuskers are stiff and sore from the fierce scrap down at Lawrence, no one is in a serious condition and Saturday will see just as strong an eleven as faced the Jayhawkers. If Ames wins it will be because they are in the same class as Harvard and Minnesota.

As the record stands now, Nebraska's claim to the title is not disputed, and it is generally conceded that Ames will go down in defeat in Saturday's contest. Iowa and Ames have both been tramped in the dust, and Kansas and Missouri have both lost. While Nebraska does not play Missouri and Iowa this year, a comparison of the three teams puts the Nebraskans far in the lead. Nebraska's one defeat at the hands of the powerful Minnesotans does not enter into the consideration. Indeed, the Cornhuskers are to be given credit for holding the Gophers to only 27 points. This was almost the same as the Minnesota score over Chicago.

### Whirlwind Finish.

With Ames and Haskell yet to play, both games in Lincoln, it looks as if the Cornhuskers will bring the season to a whirlwind finish. They have made a good start and the home stretch is in sight. The Cornhuskers get better each week. The line gets stronger, if such a thing is possible, and the backs get faster and faster.

Nebraska's line is one that will be remembered as long as football is played at Nebraska. It is, all things considered, one of the most powerful, and at the same time one of the fastest, that has ever lined up for the Scarlet and Cream. Shonka and Temple at tackle are the bright and shining stars, unequalled in the west. Chauner and Lofgren on the ends are as fast as any in the Missouri Valley. Harmon, Hornberger and Elliott furnish better material for the guards than any three men on any one team this side of the Mississippi. Collins is playing a better game at center than he ever played in his life, and that is saying a good deal. The back field is none the less brilliant than the line. Owen Frank, Minor, Warner and Rathbone are putting up a speedier and more consistent game than any back field in the Valley.

The Ames game, which will decide Nebraska's right to the pennant beyond all question, will doubtless be a drawing card and will probably be witnessed by the greatest crowd of the season.

### PREPARING FOR EXHIBIT.

According to Mr. Ashby, his appointment makes the eleventh appointment of a Nebraska graduate to the faculty of this school.

While in the University of Nebraska Mr. Ashby was prominent in school affairs. He was a member of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity. Shortly after graduation he became an assistant at the state farm and later went to the State College of Washington, where he held a like position until his recent promotion.

### IN UNIFORMS TUESDAY.

Cadets Appear in Suits for First Time This Year.

For the first time this year the university cadets appeared last night in full uniform. The appearance was rather "natty" in view of the fact that every cadet had the uniform white gloves and white linen collars. The uniform this year is exactly the same as that now used in the U. S. regular army, with the exception of the trimmings. The price of the uniform this year is \$12.40, this figure being somewhat cheaper than the price charged cadets last year for uniforms.

The cadet manual, being formulated and written by H. S. Yates, commandant of the university cadets, is rapidly nearing completion and is expected to be in press by the end of the month. This manual is being written primarily for Nebraska cadet use.

### ARE THE FAVORITES.

Nebraska or Minnesota Expect to Win

the Championship in Cross-

Country.

A forecast of the intercollegiate cross-country run to be held on November 19, seems to indicate that the real struggle will be between Minnesota and Nebraska. Minnesota won the contest last year and is coming back with an equally strong team, while reports from Nebraska indicate that a wealth of strong material is available for the coaches.

The situation at Wisconsin is not as promising as might be hoped. Some of last year's men have come out, but there is a lamentable lack of good men to draw on in case of injury to any of the regulars. The try-out a week ago did not raise any especially rosy prospects. Unless the situation improves considerably, Wisconsin will be hard pressed to make a good showing on November 19.

The colleges participating in the run will be Wisconsin, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Purdue, Minnesota, Indiana, Chicago, Northwestern and Notre Dame.—Daily Cardinal.

## MAY BE DECREASED IN SIZE

NEBRASKAN MAY BE CHANGED TO A FOUR-COLUMN SHEET.

EXPENSES ARE TOO HIGH NOW

PUBLICATION BOARD TO MEET TO CONSIDER CHANGE.

Advertising and Subscriptions Have Grown, but Deficit Has Been Incurred from Expense of Printing.

The publication board will meet this evening to consider the financial condition of the Daily Nebraskan. Since the enlargement of the paper two years ago from a four-column paper to its present five column form, the "Rag" has never been self-supporting. A surplus of over \$600 accumulated while the paper was a four-column sheet has all been used up and the paper is now facing a deficit.

Expenses increased.

This condition of affairs has been caused not so much by any decrease in receipts as by the greatly increased expenses incurred by enlarging the paper and an increase in the price charged by the printer. The receipts from advertising and subscriptions have always grown steadily, although the number of subscribers among the students is not as large as it should be. The students at Nebraska are getting a better college paper than any other school in the west and yet inquiries addressed to other schools have shown that the number of subscribers here is far below what it is in other schools.

There seems to be but one course of action open to the publication board, and that is to change the paper back to its old four-column size. Experience has shown that the students of Nebraska will not support the paper in its present size, and the only alternative seems to be to give them one that they will support.

It is very probable that some definite action will be taken at the meeting of the members of the publication board this evening. The publication board has control of the paper and they will decide what will be done in the way of the change which is considered. The Rag is owned by a corporation of which the regents own a controlling interest. The other shares are owned by two alumni of Nebraska.

Over Two Years.

The Nebraskan has been run at the present size for a little over two years, the present semester being the fifth semester of the paper being issued as a five-column sheet. If the Daily is to be decreased in size it will be made to the former four-column paper which it was before the surplus was accumulated by the business department.

### FRESHMAN SOCIAL.

First Year Students to Be Entertained by the Y. M. C. A.

The big freshman stag social, which is being conducted under the management of the university Y. M. C. A., will take place next Friday evening at 8 o'clock in Memorial hall. This is a new feature in the Y. M. C. A. social program, and it promises to be a marked success. The causes which prompted such a reception lie chiefly in the desire to get the first year men together, to arouse some genuine class spirit. Many new and novel stunts have been planned by the social committee, in the way of providing amusements that will aid every one in getting acquainted with his fellow classmen. A speech will be made by the president of the association on "Class Spirit."
