DEBATING ON DECEMBER 2

WISCONSIN TEAM COMES TO LINCOLN FOR SECOND TIME.

LOCAL SOCIETIES WILL ATTEND

JUDGES SELECTED ARE ALL FROM THE STATE OF IOWA.

University Authorities Have Precluded Possibility of Other Events on That Date.

Annual intercollegiate debates for the Central Debating league will take place Friday night, December 2. The question for discussion is the closed versus the open shop.

The debates in which Nebraska will participate will be the Nebraska-Wisconsin contest and the Nebraska-Illinois contest. In the former, Wisconsin will come to Lincoln for the second time in the history of the two institutions; in the latter, Nebraska will go to Illinois for the second time in the history of the contesting universities.

For the Nebraska-Wisconsin debate, arrangements are being made to seat a majority of the university and Lincoln organizations that have for their purpose the promotion of public speaking and forensic discussion. Some of the organizations and societies that have formerly had reservations at the intercollegiate debates, and in all probability will have reservations at the Nebraska-Wisconsin debate are: Union society, Palladian society, Students' Debating club, Platform club, Phi Alpha Tau, University College of Agriculture Debating club, Lincoln high school debating clubs, and delegations from other high schools near Lincoln.

Juries Have Been Picked.

According to the Central Debating league system for selecting judges for intercollegiate debates, recently described in the Daily Nebraskan, Nebraska and Wisconsin and Nebraska and Illinois have agreed upon juries without difficulty. Between the first mentioned universities three men agreeable to both universities, were submitted on the first list. Their names are not open to publication. They are or have been prominent state officers of Iowa, the state from which, according to the league rule, all of the jurors for the Nebraska-Wisconsin debate must come. In the selection of judges for the Nebraska-Illinois debate the universities overlapped in two instances on the first list submitted, the third judge as yet not chosen.

No Other Events.

One of the significant features in regard to the Nebraska-Wisconsin debate is that the university has made provisions that no university events will be held on the night of the debate. This is an effort on the part of the authorities to cause students to take as great an interest in debate as they do in some of the other university activities.

The university debating squad is grinding along in the usual routine preparatory to the deciding contest. No predictions are being made regarding the outcome of either team, but it is apparent to the casual observer of work being done that the teams will enter their respective contests with as

much preparation as a Nebraska squad ever had, and prove themselves good representatives of their school.

"ZOO" CLUB TO MEET.

First Assembly of the Students of the Zoological Club Will Be Held Saturday.

The first meeting of the Zoological club for the year will be held in the zoological lecture room, N210, at 7:30 p. m. Friday, November 11. INTERPRETATIVE REARING.

No admission will be charged for the program, which will commence at 8 o'clock.

TICKETS IN DEMAND.

NEBRASKAN HONORED.

Law School Review Makes Mention of Work of Roscoe Pound.

The November number of the Law School Review has the following to say of Roscoe Pound:

"Roscoe Pound, one of the best-known legal educators in the country, has been elected to the faculty in the Harvard law school. The Harvard law school, as well as Harvard university as a whole, is to be congratulated in securing the services of Mr. Pound. Mr. Pound's ability as a scholar, teacher and writer is recognized throughout the country, while his varied experience in law school work and untiring energy will prove a valuable asset to the Harvard law school. Mr. Pound will have charge of the second and third year courses in equity, and will also have a course in 'Roman law and the principles of civil law and modern codes as developments thereof, and introduction to comparative law.'"

Dr. Pound was formerly dean of the college of law of the University of Nebraska, and resigned his position to accept a position in the faculty of Northwestern university. From there he went to Chicago university and now he has accepted a position on the faculty of the law school of Harvard.

Class Games to Start Monday, Freshmen vs. Sophomores and Juniors vs. Seniors.

The Iowa agriculturists will arrive tomorrow for a scrap over the Missouri Valley championship, and the indications are that the Cornhuskers will have a lively time holding their own. Ames wants to win and is working hard to carry off the laurels. Nebraska must win, or lose the Missouri Valley championship pennant. "So near, yet"—the game to morrow will tell the tale.

Since the Kansas game a week ago, in which the Cornhuskers covered themselves with glory and black and blue spots, Cole has been keeping his men on the jump. Better to have lost to Kansas, and had it over with, than lose now. All members of the team have gotten over their soreness and are in good shape for the game tomorrow.

Members of the team say it was the Nebraska enthusiasm displayed at the Kansas rally and the send-off given them the night of their departure for Lawrence that won the Jayhawker game. No doubt this is true, for the enthusiasm displayed and the exhibition of school spirit among the students was enough to inspire the football players on to mighty deeds of valor.

Enthusiasm Necessary.

Another opportunity for just such a display is now presented to the student body. The game tomorrow will be one of Nebraska's hardest, and it is certainly the most important of the games yet to be played. Upon the outcome depends the Missouri Valley championship. If Nebraska wins the pennant will wave along with the Scarlet and Cream for the next twelve months. If Ames wins, it will start a three-cornered fight which may be finished and which may not. If enthusi-

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asm won the Kansas game it can win the Ames game. Every student in the school who would like to see the Cornhuskers wipe Ames off the map and nail the championship banner on "King" Cole's front door, is urged to bedeck himself with a few scarlet and cream ribbons, borrow someone else's megaphone, and join the gang in the bleachers.

Class Games Begin.

Class football starts Monday, with two games on the athletic field. The first, between the freshman and sophomore teams, will be played at 2 o'clock. The seniors will meet the juniors immediately after the under classmen's game.

Football rivalry this year is keen and the games scheduled for Monday will be well worth taking in. Two games for 25 cents is an opportunity seldom placed before the students of the university. The proceeds, by the way, are to be used in the purchase of sweaters for the members of the winning team. The two winners in Monday's games will play for the championship next Friday.

All four teams have been practicing for the past week and are in good shape for hard games. The rules this year are to be more rigidly enforced than last year and all who are ineligible will be ruled out. According to the rules, no players who made the varsity or the varsity squad, or who made the regular freshman team will be allowed to play in class teams.

TO VISIT THE STATE FARM

SPECIAL TRAIN TO BRING SOUTH OMAHA MEN TO LINCOLN.

TO ARRIVE SATURDAY MORNING

BUILDINGS, GROUNDS AND LIVE STOCK TO BE INSPECTED.

Luncheon to Be Served in Home Economics Building—Chancellor Avery to Speak—Will Attend Ames-Nebraska Game in Body.

A delegation of one hundred men representing the packing and allied interests of South Omaha is to come to Lincoln by special train Saturday morning of this week, for the purpose of visiting the university farm to see the fat cattle exhibit which is to be forwarded to Chicago for the International Live Stock Exposition later in the month. These men have also planned to attend the Ames-Nebraska football game in a body during the afternoon, leaving for Omaha in the evening. Secretary Stryker of the South Omaha live stock exchange has already sent a check to Manager Eager to cover the cost of one hundred seats for this game.

To Reciprocate.

For the past few years Prof. H. R. Smith, head of the department of animal husbandry, has taken, each year, a trainload of agricultural students to South Omaha to enable those who have been studying methods of animal production to become familiar, also, with the methods of distribution in practice at the large packing centers. These annual visits have proved to be extremely interesting to the students because of the special displays made for their benefit, and the hospitality shown by the Union Stock Yards company in providing a complimentary banquet at the close of the day. Manager Buckingham of this company has taken a special interest in the students of the college of agriculture, contributing each year \$500 in scholarships for self-supporting students and paying also the entire expenses of the student judging team which represents Nebraska at the International Live Stock Show.

Arrive at 9:30 a. m.

The South Omaha excursionists will reach Lincoln at 9:30 in the morning and will go direct to the university farm, where the forenoon will be spent in looking over the grounds and buildings and inspecting the live stock. They will be given luncheon in the home economics building, where short addresses will be made by the chancellor and others. Special cars are to be provided by the traction company to take the delegation to the city campus for the game after the luncheon.
