COLORED STUDENTS COMPETITION.
 Washington Man Offers Essay Prize
 for Colored Students in Ameri-
 can Colleges.
 Through the generosity of the Hon-
 orable R. W. Tyler, Washington, D. C.,
 a prize of \$50 is offered to colored stu-
 dent members of junior and senior
 classes in American colleges.
 The conditions which govern the
 competition are as follows:
 1. All competitors must be colored
 students, bona fide juniors and seniors
 in attendance at some American col-
 lege.
 2. Essay must not exceed 4,000
 words in length, must be typewritten
 on but one side of the paper, 12 inches
 by 10 inches with a margin to the left
 of the page at least one inch. No
 essay must in any case bear the name
 of the competitor. Each essay should
 bear a number. The same number
 should be written in an envelope with-
 in which is a sheet of paper bearing
 the name, college and postoffice ad-

dress of the contestant. The whole,
 essay and envelope, should be forward-
 ed to Prof. Kelly Miller not later than
 March 1, 1911.

3. The subject of the essay contest
 for 1911 will be, "The Negro's Place
 in the Present Industrial Development
 of the South." Those intending to take
 part should hand in their names before
 January 1, to Prof. Kelly Miller How-
 ard, University of Washington, D. C.
