drill that is justified by the credit given.

What justification, then, for keeping the regiment overtime. Other classes are required to stop promptly at ten minutes to the hour. This rule is boldly and regularly overlooked in military science. It is the unusual thing to be dismissed by five minutes to six, while on Monday evening we were retained till 6:05. This is a more serious matter than may appear on the face of it.

Aside from the disgust and impatience engendered, we must consider those students who work for their board. Many of these are due at such a time that any unusual delay makes them late for their work, with the attendant dangers of dismissal, etc. Besides this, five to fifteen minutes are not to be sneered at. We waste that much, most of us, it is true, every day, but we resent having to spend fifteen minutes in doing something which we do not like and which we should not be obliged to do. Many a student who willingly spends ten or fifteen minutes in voluntary drilling before the hour, is highly indignant because he is obliged to spend it after the hour. Remember that clothes must be changed after drill and this complicates the matter.

Other classes can not be held in this way. I understand that a rather severe censure is meted out to instructors who persistently hold overtime. Unfortunately, many professors do try

THE FORUM

The Editor of the Nebraskan:

A flagrant violation of university rules and a total disregard of the rights of the students brought rather forcibly to the mind of the several hundred students taking military drill, the condition of affairs existing there. According to the catalog, a credit point should represent about three hours' work. As a modest estimate at least one hour more than this is required in military science, this being exclusive of the extra study required of second year men when class work begins. In this condition, there is nothing unusual; other subjects frequently require more than their quota, but at least, no one can maintain that students do not spend every minute on

The spirit of the zoology professor in apologizing to a class accidentally held over time is, unhappily, very rare, but it should be encouraged.
