## READY FOR THE INDIANS

FOOTBALL TEAM PREPARES FOR CLOSING GAME.

WILL MEET THE FRESHMEN SATURDAY

NO ADMISSION WILL BE CHARGED TO THE GAME.

Teachers from Over the State Will Fill the Bleachers on Thanksgiving Day.

"King" Cole's footballists are working out for the Haskell game, which will bring the season to a close on Thanksgiving day. They were out last night for a brisk signal practice, but spent most of their time perched on the administration building steps getting the official picture taken to print in the rule book.

By the time the Thanksgiving day game rolls around, if everything goes smoothly, the Cornhuskers will be in condition to put up the most powerful game of the season. Every man is now in the best of physical condition and the few minor injuries of the past two hard games have nearly all disappeared.

The Cornhuskers will take things easy Saturday in the game against the freshmen and will take no chances on any one getting laid out so he will be unable to go in against the Indians. The score will be close in any event, for even if the Cornhuskers put up their stiffest game it will be no easy matter to walk away from the freshmen. Coach Ewing has turned out a wonderful team for the first year men and they can play at least as fast a game as some of the teams Nebraska has played this season.

### No Admission.

No admission will be charged to the game Saturday. Students are urged to attend. A large attendance from the freshman class is assured, for to a man the freshmen are behind their team and will support it enthusiastically when the time comes. Class spirit in the freshman class is as keen as any class has had for years.

The Haskell game is attracting considerable attention, and while hundreds of the students will be out of the city, it is expected that the attendance will be as large as at any game so far this season. Teachers from out over the state, who will be in Lincoln for their annual meeting, are sending in for reservations and the number of visitors will more than make up for the students who are not here.

## ARE OFF FOR WISCONSIN

CROSS-COUNTRY FIVE LEAVE TODAY FOR MADISON.

CANNOT PICK THE WINNERS

COURSE AT THE BADGER SCHOOL IS RATHER HILLY.

Captain Melick, Anderson, Bates, Swanson and Hayes to "Do the Stunt" for Nebraska.

Everything is ready for the start. The University of Nebraska cross-country team will leave for Madison Wis., this afternoon at 4 o'clock to engage in the annual cross-country race

in the mid-west intercollegiate track meet.

The team, composed of W. A. Melick, captain; L. R. Anderson, V. Bates, O. M. Swanson and F. Hayes, has been in constant training ever since the time of its selection and has received every possible improvement that could be added by Dr. Clapp, coach, and Captain Melick. It is leaving for Wisconsin today highly confident that if there is any bacon to be distributed, Nebraska will receive her share.

The prospects for victory, however, are not what the coach would like to have them. As a reiteration of a statement recently issued by Dr. Clapp, the team which will represent Nebraska this year is in many respects superior to previous teams that have participated in this event. It has weakened, however, in one essential point—team work. Because of such decidedly good team work, the coach and captain maintain Nebraska has heretofore been successful in "making ends meet" at Chicago.

### Individual Runners.

This year the team is composed of what might be termed individual runners. That they have skill and speed is unquestioned, but whether they will be able to manipulate this speed toward team work success is a fact yet to be proved. Melick, Anderson and Bates are showing off great form and display every indication that they will finish the course at Madison up with or ahead of the best opposing runner.

Swanson is also showing consistent speed and is expected to hold his own in the event. Hayes, however, has not produced the speed which he promised to do. In the try-outs he has received the encouragement of his fellow runners. At Madison, however, he will have to sail his own ship if the race is to be won. In fact, the outcome of the race so far as Nebraska is concerned will depend to a great extent on the form Hayes is in.

### Team Leaves Today.

The team will leave Lincoln this afternoon over the Rock Island. They will change at Omaha to the Northwestern and arrive in Madison Friday noon. At 3 o'clock Friday every team to be entered in the big race will be taken over the course.

Concerning the time of the race, the first arrangements have been altered. Instead of having the race at 11 a. m., as it previously has been held, it will this year be called at 1:30 p. m. The only reason which partially accounts for this change is that the big Chicago-Wisconsin football game will take place Saturday afternoon, and the cross-country race will be pulled off as a forerunner to the game.

Dr. Clapp has announced that the course at Madison is much harder than the one used at Nebraska. In places it is very hilly, which is expected to handicap most of the visiting teams. The race will start at Camp Randall, then out to Lake Drive, and back to the finish on Camp Randall, covering a total distance of five miles.
