Reading the article by Mr. Reid, one is struck with the signal failures which have followed every effort to revise the rules of American football during the last five or six years. This decision is to be commended. As long as the student activities are recognized as part of a student's life in college, and these activities are given official approval it is only fitting that students taking part in them be given some credit. The next step in the process of co-ordinating the work of the class room with the extra class room activities, is the systematic organizing of these activities. There should be a careful grading of all, according to their importance, and the amount of this kind of work that any student can do should be limited. This will eliminate from the tendency for a few men to become connected with a large number of organizations to the neglect of their academic work.—Daily Maroon.

THE FOOTBALL DISCUSSION.

Let any one interested in college athletics and not yet fully convinced of the relative merits of rugby and American intercollegiate, read the two sides of the question as discussed in our California periodicals during the past week, and judge for himself on the authority of experts. Writing in The Occident, W. T. Reid, Jr., a former Harvard coach, defends the old game mainly on the ground of his prejudice against the new. On the other hand, President Wheeler, casting aside all that is not pertinent to the subject, comes out clearly to show that rugby, even though an imported game, possesses qualities which not

that the crowd on Saturday was fifty per cent larger than ever attended a game in this state before rugby was introduced.

There is a reason, and that reason is to be found in President Wheeler's article, which reads like an answer to the opinions of Mr. Reid. That rugby is better from the standpoint of the spectators, that it is better for the players and better for the colleges, than the American game, is maintained by President Wheeler in his clear-sighted, comprehensive discussion, which he closes by declaring that the perpetuation of the intercollegiate game can only be regarded as ethically wrong.—Daily Californian.
