UNI UNPLACED.

Nebraska's Cross-Country Team Fails to Cover Course in Time.

With the Nebraska cross-country team, four time winners, unplaced because of failure to cover the course in time, Wisconsin's five men made the best total and won the annual cross-country meet of the western universities Saturday morning. Dohmen, of Wisconsin, who finished first, set a record of 26 minutes, 21 seconds, which broke the record for the meet made by Lightbody of Michigan some years ago just 26 seconds. The team results:
