H. B. ENGLISH GETS THROUGH

Rhodes scholarship examinations which were held in Lincoln October 25 and 26. The Nebraska Rhodes

scholarship committee will have the task of deciding which of the two men are best fitted to receive the scholarship, with all its benefits, which entitles a man to two years' study at Oxford university, England, and a third year of either study or travel in Europe.

Announcement of the award was made Monday. Seven men took the examinations. These students were from various colleges in the state. The questions were sent out by the Rhodes scholarship board of London and the answers sent there for correction. The tests were in mathematics, Greek and Latin. No grades were announced by the English board, merely stating that the two Nebraska men had passed the examinations.

Must Consider Everything.

Several things must be considered in selecting the man to represent the state in the English institution. The general athletic, social and scholarship abilities of the men must be considered. The board who will have this task is composed of Chancellor Avery, Superintendent Davidson of the Omaha public schools and three representatives of the denominational schools of the state.

The Records.

Horace B. English is a son of Mr. and Mrs. S. S. English of Lincoln. He was graduated from the Lincoln high school in 1909, entering the university that fall. The first year in school he was selected as a member of the university debating squad, later to be chosen as an alternate on one of the university debating teams. He is a member of the Platform club of the university, the Union Literary society and the Bushnell guild. He is president of the Christian Endeavor society of the First Congregational church. He is registered as a sophomore in the university.

L. Ross Newkirk is the son of Rev. and Mrs. G. R. Newkirk of Adams where his father is pastor of the Methodist church. He is registered as a junior in the Wesleyan university. He is specializing in political science and plans to study law after he has received his A. B. degree. Neither English or Newkirk have taken an active part in athletics.

Y. M. C. A. COMMITTEE MEETS.

Treasurer for University Association to Be Chosen.

A meeting of the nominating committee of the university Y. M. C. A. is called this afternoon at the association rooms. All senior members of the Y. M. C. A. are members of this committee. It is urged that every member be present, as the important business of nominating the association treasurer will take place. Formerly the treasurer has been a student of the university, but according to the new Y. M. C. A. constitution hereafter he must be either a faculty member or an alumnus.

MAY CHANGE RULES.

Interfraternity Council to Discuss Probable Changes.

At the meeting of the interfraternity council which is scheduled for Wednesday evening matters regarding the changing of the fraternity "rushing" rules will probably be brought up and the matter decided. It has been proposed that a rule be passed allowing no new students to be "pledged" until they have the full number of entrance credits, thirty, and no student be initiated until they have completed twelve hours of university work. Another change suggested is that all "rushing" be confined to the entire first semester, and that no student be "pledged" until that period of time has elapsed. It is possible that the rules may be passed, but a number of fraternities oppose them on the grounds that the period allowed for "rushing" new students is too long. The "rushing" season at the present time lasts but ten days.
