groups of legislators is an embarrassment to the university's interests.

The board authorized the placing of an order completing the plan adopted in 1907, namely, the installation of a two-story steel stack of art metal construction throughout the rest of the stack room of the library building. It is necessary to place the order now in order that the stacks may be installed by the first of August next.

The board adopted the draft of the biennial report to the governor as drawn by the executive committee. The more important features of this report will be given to the public after it has been duly placed in the hands of the governor. The report is written under the assumption that the colleges of the university, aside from medicine and agriculture, will remain indefinitely and be developed on or in connection with the present city campus.

**Favor Change in "Medic" College.**

By formal vote the board placed itself on record as favoring giving at the earliest possible moment two of the six years medical course in Lincoln and four in Omaha, instead of four in Lincoln and two in Omaha as at present. This is in accordance with the best authorities on medical education, particularly the Flexner report, which emphasizes the need of laboratory instruction to accompany the clinical instruction in the two last years of the course.
