WORK TO BE REPRESENTATIVE

DEPARTMENTS CREATED MAKE LESS INDIVIDUALISM.

Artists Are Working—English Club to Edit the Literary Department—Frederick to Be Chief Cartoonist.

Ever since early last fall, G. E. Reed and his staff of managing editors have been busy planning and arranging for the 1911 Cornhusker, which will be placed on sale.

Editor Reed has announced the entire staff who will aid him in the compilation and collection of the material to go into the big book and rapid progress will mark the work of the Cornhusker staff from now on.

Artists Busy.

While the work of arranging the big book has been carried on the artists, for the publication of the juniors and seniors, have also been working and during the past month have prepared a considerable number of drawings for the big book.

Work Divided.

The work this year has been divided into departments in order to make it representative and not appear to be the result of the labors of a few individuals. This is a new system, and all the managers are hoping that it will prove successful in order that a systematic order of things will be inaugurated.

The contract for the engraving for the Cornhusker has been let to the Buckbee-Mears Engraving company of St. Paul, Minn.

The work of the artists is being pushed by Chief Artist Frederick. Hall, Blanchard and Wicker are working on drawings for the work. All of these men have done this work before for the publications of past years and this qualifies their work. A few freshman cartoonists have submitted samples of their work to the staff.

The English club will have charge and edit the literary department and every effort is being made to make this the most artistic of any of the Cornhuskers ever published.
