PRESIDENTS MEET.

Heads of Missouri Valley Universities Discussing Athletics.

The presidents and governing boards of the Missouri Valley Conference in session at Des Moines, Ia., passed a resolution giving all athletic power to the faculty representatives except those which have already been adopted by the presidents and governing boards at previous sessions and those which may be adopted in the future. This leaves the presidents and governing boards supreme except as to details. Thanksgiving football, under this rule, is still in the hands of the presidents, who fought the question out Friday afternoon. Ames, Drake, Iowa and Missouri appeared in the forenoon to be lined up against the other members of the conference, which probably means that the rule abolishing Thanksgiving football will be rescinded. Faculty representatives must be of professional rank. The present faculty representative will act until this rule becomes effective. Professor S. W. Byers of Ames was elected president and Dr. R. G. Clapp of Nebraska was elected secretary of the faculty representatives.
