versity, and under the honor system, I am naturally very much interested in the so-called "revival meetings" for the establishment of the aforesaid code. (I am also interested in "cabs is cabs.")

In order to do something definite, one must have a plan, and so before giving some discussion to the honor system, I will briefly outline its workings in one of the leading southern universities. I do not mean that Nebraska should follow the path of the south, for I already see how you could not do so in its details, but I suggest this as a working basis.

The honor system is based primarily on students' self government. At the end of every examination the student is required to sign the pledge: "I have neither given nor receive any aid during this examination." The student also morally pledges himself to report any one whom he may see cheating. I may state here that in the disobedience of this second provision lies the drawback to the ideal application of the system.

When a gentleman (?) is observed cheating at an examination he is reported to the students' council without ado. The council is composed of the presidents of all the classes in the university, with the exception of the freshman class in the arts and sciences. The council has the power to summon witnesses and decide the guilt or innocence of the one in question. The guilty one is then "shipped." I may state that the council in this case has also jurisdiction over most of the student's blunders. A guilty one, of course, has the power of appeal to the executive committee of the faculty, and I have heard the president of the institution say that the student may then appeal to the highest tribunal—the regents.

The proceedings of the students' council are supposed to be in closed session, but the "passengers" are generally known by the students. This always acts as a pleasant warning to
