UNIVERSITY REMOVAL.

Chancellor Avery, Regent Lyford and Professor Smith Argue.

The legislative committee which is to report on the advisability of the removal of the university to the state farm campus listened Thursday evening to argument in favor of the removal by Chancellor Avery, Professor H. R. Smith and Regent Lyford. The chancellor presented a detailed statement to the committee which dealt not only with a report on the expenditure of the Morrill fund as applied to various classes of students, but included a table showing the number of students at each campus who do outside work. Especial emphasis was laid on the fact that all branches of study have been followed by the university on an almost too economical plan. one of the speaker's statements. Those who appeared before the committee had been called in to inform the legislators on points somewhat too hazy to them. The talks were informal and questions from the law makers frequently interrupted each.
