NEW BULLETIN BOARD.

Small Revolving Tower to Be Illuminated.

Yesterday a wooden contrivance much resembling a small tower was placed in front of the Administration building. There was considerable speculation as to the meaning of its appearance, some going so far as to assert that it was a sentry box for the delinquency committee. Inquiry revealed the fact that it was a new bulletin board to take the place of the old one used heretofore.

The new arrangement is an idea emulating from the office of the superintendent of constructions. The cylinder will set on a revolving steel post 18 inches from the ground, and will be placed in the center of the walk directly in front of the Administration building. Electric lights will be placed under the roof-like top, so that the notices may be read in the evening without straining the eyes.

Warner.

ENGLAND HONORS WALLACE.

Bill in Parliament to Investigate Work of Nebraskan.

That the English parliament may honor Prof. Charles William Wallace of the University of Nebraska is the report brought here by Mary L. Sullivan, an Omaha woman, who has just returned from a visit to England. A bill has been introduced in parliament providing for an investigation of Professor Wallace's discoveries, and, if they are found to be worthy, official recognition will be given him.

Professor Wallace is now in London, having been granted an extensive leave of absence from his work here in the English literature department. He has dug out of the masses of material in the British record office very important documents bearing on the life of Shakespeare that disclosed facts which have been disputed for years.
