The University of Iowa is to lose another of her big men in the near future. Charles N. Gregory, dean of the law school, has tendered his resignation, to take effect not later than the end of the present school year. Dean Gregory has been at the head of the Iowa law school for ten years and has had a big influence in its growth. No reason is given in the letter of resignation.

The subject, "Should Women in Nebraska have the right of suffrage?" will be upheld for the Unions by H. B. English and W. T. Wolvinton and for the Palladians the negative will be debated by D. M. Rogers and Alma Plasters. The meeting will begin promptly at 8 o'clock, and all members are being urged to come early.

### GROWTH IN TRAINING SCHOOL.

Differs from the Ordinary Model School.

The teachers college high school, used as a training school for university students who are going out to teach, has had a rapid growth in both numbers and efficiency. It now enrolls 118 students and covers the full four-year high school course in its curriculum and is accredited by the state high school inspector as a four-year secondary school. Forty seniors are provided with teaching facilities for one full semester each. Every class is in charge of a student who has specialized in the subject taught. If the class is an English class, the teacher in charge has usually had three years of English above the four-year high school course and in addition has had special training in the department in the technique of instruction in this subject; so with the foreign languages, mathematics and other subjects. This makes the work of this high school distinctly departmental in its type.

The work in the training school differs from that in the ordinary model school in that the teacher as-

signed to a particular class gives one full semester of continuous teaching, thus insuring continuity for the class, while in most similar schools there are two or three changes of teachers during a semester. The intending teachers are under the supervision of ten regularly employed instructors who have shown themselves to be experts in the field of secondary education. These supervisors exercise daily supervision over the practice of student teachers, requiring carefully planned outlines of each lesson and giving such direction and help as are necessary to transform the novice into a real teacher of efficiency. The work in supervision is further strengthened by the direction and oversight of heads of departments in the university. The work in German is directed by Professor Fossler; that of Latin, by Professor Barber; American history, by Professor Caldwell; geography, by Professor Condra; English language and literature, by Professor Stuff; mathematics, by Professor Candy; physical sciences, by Professor Brownell; French, by Professor Conklin; agriculture, by Assistant Professor French, and domestic science, by Professor Folger. Dean Fordyce has charge of the technique of the methods of instruction in general. The state examining board recently inspected this school and gave its hearty approval of the administration.
