**STUDENTS DEFEND LUKHART.**

**Justice Fullerton Has Cab Case Under Advisement.**

The University of Nebraska law school had an inning in Judge Fullerton's court yesterday when the case of Eugene A. Levi versus R. H. Luikhart was brought to trial. Never in the history of the court was there so much legal talent present. Besides Dale Boyles and W. M. Sommerville, who were the attorneys for the plaintiff, a large number of students attended in a body to offer advice if necessary, and the court was swamped with evidence ranging from extracts of a family Bible to district court proceedings.

The case is an outgrowth of the famous "cabs is cabs" war. Mr. Levi is a liveryman and alleges that Luikhart owes him for cab hire to a formal last spring. Luikhart's attorneys claim the hack was rented to two couples and that their client has paid his share and also set up the plea of infancy. Justice of the Peace Fullerton will hand down a decision in three or four days. The amount of judgment asked by the plaintiff is \$1.75 and costs.
