REV. O. W. FIFER IS CHOSEN

NEBRASKA ALUMNUS TO PREACH BACCALAUREATE SERMON NEXT JUNE.

Rev. O. W. Fifer, pastor of the Grace Methodist Episcopal church in Des Moines, has been selected to preach the baccalaureate sermon at the commencement exercises next June. He graduated from the University of Nebraska, taking his bachelor of literature degree, in 1889 and the master of arts in 1895.

After graduation Rev. Fifer spent some time as a reporter on the State Journal. Later he decided to enter the ministry and after being ordained was assigned a pastorate in Nebraska. Two years were spent at Geneva, from which place he went to York, where he remained about five years. Rev. Fifer then received the call to the Grace Methodist church at Des Moines.
