FIELD TO COACH TRACK TEAM

AMES, KANSAS AND MINNESOTA ARE ON THE SCHEDULE OF DUAL EVENTS.

O. F. Field was yesterday elected coach of the university track team. This announcement was not altogether unsuspected since Mr. Field has been assistant in the department of physical education for some time and also basketball coach during the last season. If his efforts as track coach are as successful as they have been in other divisions of the athletic curriculum, Nebraska will again make a credible showing in the intercollegiate meets.

The Nebraska track schedule for the coming season has also been announced, as follows:

- April 29—Ames at Ames.
- May 6—Kansas at Lincoln.
- May 13—Minnesota at Minneapolis.
- May 20—Open date.
- May 26 and 27—Missouri Valley conference at Des Moines.

Nebraska will probably be represented in both of the western intercollegiate indoor athletic meets to be held at Kansas City and Omaha. An invitation has been received for entry to the Kansas City athletic meet for March 25, but as yet no formal acceptance has been made. In all probability, however, a small team will participate in this event. The athletic board of the university has already approved the Nebraska entry in the Omaha meet to be held on April 1. Heretofore Nebraska has been very successful in this meet. If held in accordance with previous custom, it will also be a handicap event.

GOVERNOR WILL SEE PLAY.
